J. Ellen Gainor Visits

Professor J. Ellen Gainor, Professor of Theatre and Associate Dean of the Graduate School at Cornell University, will be the first **Lecturers and Readers** visitor of Spring 2004. She will deliver a presentation on Susan Glaspell on Friday, 5 March (see "Calendar") and serve as respondent to a staged reading of Glaspell's play, *Inheritors*, on Saturday, 6 March (see below and "Calendar"). Professor Glaspell teaches 20th-century American drama, Victorian and Edwardian drama, and contemporary theatre and performance at Cornell. Her most recent publication is the definitive study *Susan Glaspell in Context: American Theater, Culture and Politics 1915-1948*. She is now editing Glaspell's complete plays, as well as the forthcoming *Norton Anthology of Drama*.

Inheritors

A staged reading of Susan Glaspell's *Inheritors* will be presented on Saturday, 6 March, at 4:00 pm, in 100 Smith Hall (directly across Jayhawk Blvd. from the Kansas Union). Lecturers and Readers visitor J. Ellen Gainor will serve as respondent to the reading. **Iris Fischer** directs a cast which includes many English Department participants, including **Amy Devitt, Frank Farmer, Ellen Fangman, Shelley Manis,** and **Anjali Nerlekar**. Department posterity is represented by **Colin Elliott**. The cast also includes Professor John Staniunas from Theatre & Film and Professor Ann Schofield from American Studies/Women's Studies.
