Luis Alberto Urrea to Deliver American and **British Lecture**

Award-winning and critically acclaimed author Luis Alberto Urrea will deliver The 2009 American and British Lecture, the final English Lecturers & Readers event of the academic year, on Wednesday, 15 April, at 7:00 pm. in Alderson Auditorium of the Kansas Union. Urrea has written eleven books, including the national bestsellers *The* Hummingbird's Daughter, a novel, and The Devil's Highway, a non-fictional account of fourteen undocumented border crossers who died in the Arizona desert in 2001. Pulitzer Prize finalist for The Devil's Highway, Urrea has also won the Kiriyama Prize for fiction, a Lannan Literary Award, an American Book Award, a Christopher Award, and a Western States Book Award.

Lecturer Awarded Summer Literary Seminar Fellowship

Megan Kaminski, lecturer in English, will venture to Vilnius, Lithuania for two weeks this summer courtesy of the Summer Literary Seminar program. Kaminski was a finalist in the Summer Literary Seminars 2009 Unified Fiction and Poetry Contest. Though she did not win, the committee was so impressed with her work that they awarded her this fellowship which "brings the best contemporary writers of the moment together." Kaminski will take poetry seminars from highlyregarded poets Erin Mouré and Peter Cole during her two weeks abroad, but the program

also serves as a writing retreat. For the past ten years, SLS has been held in St. Petersburg, Russia. This is the first year it has been held in Vilnius. Kaminski teaches Introduction to Poetry and Poetry Writing courses in the Department. Her work appears regularly in poetry journals and she recently published a chapbook, Across Soft Ruins.
