## Kate Greenstreet Reading

Poet **Kate Greenstreet** will read from her work on Monday, 23 September, at 7:30 pm, at the Commons in Spooner Hall. Greenstreet's reading is the second event of the academic year in KU English's **Visiting Writer Series**. Kate Greenstreet's most recent book of poetry is *Young Tambling* (Ahsahta Press, 2013) from which she will read. Press publicity states, "*Young Tambling* resonates with Greenstreet's relentless exploration of what it means to be human, to need to feel, to make art. Memory, in this book of 'experimental memoir,' works something like the narrative tactics of a traditional ballad. . . . In *Young Tambling*, a life's meaning is born of its poet's song, and a memory cannot reveal a truth until it finds its ballad." Greenstreet is also the author of two other collections of poetry, *The Last 4 Things* (2009) and *case sensitive* (2006), also from Ahsahta. She has also published seven chapbooks and her poetry can be found in *Denver Quarterly*, *Chicago Review*, *Boston Review*, and other journals and anthologies.
