The John F. Eberhardt Memorial Lecture

Case Western Reserve Distinguished Professor of English Thrity Umrigar will deliver this year's John F. Eberhardt Memorial Lecture on Thursday, 11 October, at 7:00 pm in Three West (3rd Floor), Watson Library. Her topic is "Literature as a Bridge Between Us." Event publicity suggests that she will read from and discuss her newest novel. The Secrets Between Us (2018) in the context of her earlier novel, The Space Between Us (2009), and explain how both works describe "the external and internal nature of poverty." In general, she will consider "the role of literature in describing new worlds and in fostering compassion and empathy for people whose lives we may never otherwise know." Umrigar has

written eight novels, a memoir, and a children's picture book. She has won numerous awards for her fiction and her work has been published in fifteen countries. Before her appointment at Case, Umrigar was a journalist for seventeen years. She continues to contribute to the book pages of the *Boston Globe* and the *Washington Post*. The annual John F. Eberhardt Memorial Lecture honors prominent Wichita lawyer and long-time KU supporter John F. Eberhardt who wished to promote "excellence in writing" at the University of Kansas.

• Several of the organizers of KU's 10/16-10/21 **Unexpected Caribbean Symposium** are based in the English Department. **Giselle Anatol**, KU English Director of Graduate Studies, is also currently serving as President of the international Association of Caribbean Women Writers

& Scholars. English professor Marta Caminero-Santangelo is Director of the Center for Latin American and Caribbean Studies, not to mention Interim Director of the Hall Center for the Humanities. Recent English MA grad Aron Muci and current English MA student Mikaela Warner have also played integral roles in preparing for the symposium. New MA grad student Aundrea Davis has also been helping, specifically with the KU Libraries exhibit. The symposium itself will run from Wednesday, 10/17, through Sunday, 10/21. Papers and other events scheduled as part of the symposium are intended to "reveal some of the unexpected moments and instances of surprise in Caribbean literature, film, history, culture, law, and landscape."
